LABOUR controlled Camden council may show a dramatic change of heart over its decision to develop Tolmers Square, Euston. with Joe Levy's Stock Con-version and Investment Trust.

Since the council's community planning and resources countil-tee decided lost week to reject a non-prode development scheme for the 11-cere site, two Labour party brenches have confirmed the decision and a Camaeu resident has served the council with a with

Hampstead Labour Party voted overwheimingly to true the council to reverse its decision while St Pancras North party executive voted unanimously to petition Canaden to stop the Levy scheme going alread.

Mr Nicholas Tomalin, a jour-nalist from Glowester Crescent. Camden Town, has asked the High Court to declare that Cam-den is not acting in the best interests of the ratepayers in going ahead with the joint development with Stock Conver-sion.

clindius Properties, a company cet up by Christopher Booker and Bennie Gray, has proposed that it would develop the 250,000 square test of shops and offices planned for Tolmer Square and used for profit—up to £20,000,000—to subsidise the con-

struction of 474 council houses on the site.

But to do this, Comden has to break off negotiations with Stock Conversion on a similar scheme and ask the Environment Secretary to sanction the compulsory purchase of half the Tolner Square site, already owned by Stock Conversion.

Councillors who rejected this scheme told Labour Party branches this week that the Tory government was unlikely to approve the compulsory purchase

orders and Camden world lose the bouses or suffer years of delay in their construction. But Mr Beverley Rowe, chair-man of St Panetas North Isbour Party, said: "We feel this is the opportunity to make a stand against developers and introduce a new form of non-profit develop-ment."

Council members who support that view hope to persuade the Labour group that it is not too late to stop the Stock Conversion deat.
