Murdered widow clue

DETECTIVES piecing together the last hours of murdered widow Mrs Rosina Gavin, are trying to establish if she was near her former home in Tolmers Square, Euston, shortly before she was brutally killed.

Mrs Gavin, 62, whose partially clothed body was discovered in the bathroom of her council flat on the Regents Park Estate, was last seen alive at 5 pm, on Saturday, April 28.

One detective working on the case from special headquarters set up at Albany Street police station, said:

"Anyone who remembers seeing her in the area or who knows that she had an appointment on Saturday evening should contact the police immediately, at 387-1113."

I want apology — tycoon Levy

SOLICITORS for property developer Mr Joe Levy have demanded an apology from Thames Television and Camden Council for a statement made on the Today programme by Councillor Brian Loughran.

Mr Levy, whose company Stock Conversion and Investment Trust Ltd, is to develop Tolmers Square, Euston, with the co-operation of Camden Council, claims he has been libelled by Mr Loughran's remarks concerning the deal.

On the Today programme on May 3, Mr Loughran, who was a vigorous opponent of the bargain struck between the council and Mr Levy, stated his views as part of a film about the Levy operations in the area.

On Wednesday night, the council endorsed the terms

for the Tolmers Square development, under which Mr Levy gets planning permission for an office block, and help with compulsory purchase powers in return for subsidising eight and a half acres of housing land for Camden.

Under the terms of the deal Camden may also get a share in the profits of the office building—but only provided Mr Levy's company makes more than a 13 per cent return on its investment in the first year of letting the building.
