Man behind the scheme is 48-year-old Mr. Leonard Harvey, a married man, who has been in business in Camden Town for 20 years. "I think it would be nice to have a market here. It's a good spot for it," said Mr.

Harvey, who lives in Muswell Hill.

"You can't put houses here or offices, so a market is about the only thing you could do with it. It's a nice, place, pleasant, and I'd hate to see it just left.

"If I'm willing to take a gamble, I hope the council will back me."

Mr. Harvey started making cardboard boxes in railway arches near the bridge over Kentish Town Road under the name of Harvey Containers Ltd.

Then he opened and leased a dress factory called "Soula Fashions" and bought four empty, derelict shops in Kentish Town Road.

The land on which Mr. Harvey wants to put the market is at the back of these properties. And if his scheme got off the ground he would consider knocking down his cardboard factory to extend the market.

The derelict shops in Kentish Town Road would be demolished and a wide entrance made to the market to allow for lorries making deliveries.

Mr. Harvey's scheme is to be discussed soon by the council's planning committee.

Death of Cllr. John Keohane



Camden councillor John Keohane, aged 41, Labour member for Gospel Oak ward, Kentish Town, collapsed and died on Tuesday morning near Telephone House, Willesden, where he worked.

And as news of his death spread among shocked councillors, they paid tribute to him this week.

Labour councillor Brian Loughran, a close friend of Cllr. Keohane, said he was "a tremendous local

councillor and worker. He was a positive man. Those who disliked him disliked him a lot, but those who liked him liked him tremendously. He was a terrific worker in Gospel Oak."

Cllr. Keohane was elected for Gospel Oak at the council elections last May. Cllr. Keohane and his wife,

Jenny, lived at Gordon House Road, Kentish Town. They had no children.

The funeral is being held today (Friday).

Cllr. Keohane was full-time trade union worker as branch secretary of the London North-West Telephone Area, Civil and Public Services Association.

He had a disablement pension from the army for heart trouble but had not been ill recently.
