Plans for V-day celebrations in St. Pancras have now been completed. On Wednesday, the council approved the arrangements, which include special cinema performances for 4,000 children, cost £60. Two concerts for old people in the borough, to be held at the Assembly Hall on June 8 (one from 4 to 6 p.m. and the other from 7 to 9 p.m.).

The programme, which has been specially arranged to appeal to the old people, will include a comedian, singers, conjuror and accordionist, at a cost of £60.

St. Pancras Parish Church and the Town Hall are to be flood-lit for one week at a cost of £75.

Town Hall is to be decorated with flags at a cost of £50.

### INFORMATION BUREAU

Proposals to set up an information bureau at the Town Hall were considered.

The bureau would assist the public by dealing with inquiries relating to a wide range of subjects, including housing, rent restrictions control, public health, rationing, maternity and child welfare, social services, pensions, fuel, rehabilitation, etc.

Sub-centres may also be located in branch libraries.

### AWAY WITH SHELTERS

A report stated, with regard to basement shelters, that:—

1.—Since the last meeting shelters at No. 101-103, Drummond Street, and No. 320-326, Euston Road, have been demolished and derequisitioned.

2.—Army units have in hand the demolition of shelters at Carver's Lane, No. 52-56, Fitzroy Street, Camley Street Warehouse. These will be derequisitioned on completion.

3.—The Home Office have approved the derequisitioning of shelters at Camden Street (Maple's) and Carver's Lane (Riley's).

### INCREASED BURIAL CHARGES

St. Pancras and Islington Borough Councils have agreed to increase burial charges at Finchley Cemeteries. The increased charges, which affect ordinary interments and private graves of 1st, 2nd and 3rd classes, range from 8s. to £6.


### 120 FLATS
