A TREMBLING middle-aged St. Pancras housewife told the
mass rents protest meeting at Holborn Hall on Tuesday
that she had been told to quit her home after living there for
20 years.

She was Mrs. Florence
Makepeace, of No. 69 Euston
Street. She became flustered
as she took over the micro-
phone at the meeting. "I didn't
want to come up here," she
said, "but they made me."

She fidgeted with some
papers in her hand and then
stooped down to speak to Cllr.
John Lawrence.

"You know, I'm ever so
nervous," she said. "I've
never spoken on a platform
before."

A loud round of applause
and prolonged cheers encour-
aged her. "I've lived in my
house for 20 years and now
my landlord has given me
notice to quit," she said.

Cries of 'shame'

She alleged that her land-
lord, Mr. E. Birkhead, who
lived in the house next door
which he ran as a boarding

house, wanted her premises
for "bed and breakfast"
accommodation.

"I took my paralysed
mother to live with me in
1941," she said. There were a
few sympathetic cries of
"shame".

"I don't know where we
shall go," she said.

She sat down amid a loud
burst of cheering and applause.

That was the whole story
as told by Mrs. Makepeace to
the audience.

But what the audience did
not hear was that Mrs. Make-
peace has two lodgers—two
men aged 74 and 64, who pay
her 12s. 6d. each a week for
the two rooms they occupy;
that she has an eight-roomed
house and that three of the
rooms are empty.

Her lodgers

Her mother? "Oh, my
mother died some time ago,"
Mrs. Makepeace told the
"N.L.P." "It's not that I'm
worried about. It's my lodgers:
where will they go?"

The empty rooms? "I'm not
letting the landlord come into
those," she said firmly. "Why,
once he is in the house, there
will be no stopping him."

Mr. Birkhead, the landlord,
commented: "Yes, I do want
them to leave."

"She has two lodgers whom
she should not have under the
agreement and, as far as we
are concerned, that means she
has five empty rooms."

"Yes, I would consider
turning them out on the
street. I have offered to give
them some financial help if
they go and I have also looked
round for a new place for
them."

"I have not found anywhere
yet but I am afraid I want
them out in October. I don't
say I will be round on the
sixth to evict them but I
would want to know some
good reasons why they haven't
gone."
