Mr. Ernest Bayliss, chairman of the housing committee, said it was not the policy to serve schedules of works on the owners. It was only necessary for the medical officer of health to represent that the houses were unfit for human habitation.

If the owners chose to approach the council, he was sure that they could be given a list of the repairs that needed to be carried out to make the properties habitable.

Later, Mr. Wynn told the "North London Press" that he could not understand why he had been ruled out of order. Ireland, "to break the financial connections with Empire and to establish the real freedom of an Irish and democratic Socialist Republic."

The I.W.U. asserts that its aims include the promotion among Irish workers of an appreciation of democratic socialist policies and the formation of clubs to provide educational, cultural and co-operative activities to take special interest in the problems and welfare of young Irish immigrants.

It also claims to assist financially the Labour movement in Ireland by the sale of its publications among Irish workers in Britain and by contributions to strike funds and political campaigns.

All members of the Irish Workers' Union must belong to their respective trade unions. Members of the Communist Party and its auxiliary organisations or of Fascist bodies are not eligible for membership of the I.W.U.

This ruling is in line with Marxist policy which is fundamentally opposed to the present Communist regime in Russia. The Marxists contend that the Communists are willing to compromise with the capitalist system

BOY WHO WAS FATALLY HURT Teachers and pupils among the mourners

REPRESENTATIVES of the governors, teaching staff and pupils of Tollington Park School were among the mourners at the funeral on Wednesday of 15-year-old David James Moore, of Marlborough Road, N.19, who was fatally injured when he was knocked down by a car on a pedestrian crossing near Holloway Tube station, Holloway Road, on Sunday, January 10.

The funeral, which followed a service at St. John's Church, Pemberton Gardens, took place at St. Marybone Crematorium.

Accompanied by three school friends, David—the only child of Mr. and Mrs. James Moore—was returning from a visit to a cinema when he was knocked down. He was taken to the Royal Northern Hospital where an operation was performed in a bid to save his life. He died on Wednesday morning of last week.

The inquest was opened at St. Pancras on Friday, and adjourned until February 12.

At St. John's

Wreaths from the school's commerce club of which David was chairman, the fifth and 4a forms, and Red House, were among the flowers carried on the cortege. The service at St. John's was conducted by the vicar, the Rev. John Potter.

Before going to Tollington Park School, David was a pupil at St. John's Church School, and a member of the Sunday school for ten years. He was also a former chorister.

"The whole school has been depressed by his tragic death," said Mr. R. J. Werry, headmaster of Tollington Park School. Popular with all his fellow-pupils, he displayed a lively interest in the school's activities and had been studying hard to take his G.C.E. this year.

"He was in every respect a shining light and set a splendid example to his school," a member of David's family told the "North London Press."

Said his mother, Mrs. Ivy Moore: "No one could have wished for a better son. We have been greatly comforted by the letters we have received from people who knew David."

be no objection to residential development as suggested for the north side. But clearly this would not be the sort of accommodation any of the present tenants could afford."

"We feel the only way out is for the L.C.C. to take the square over, demolish the Tolmer Cinema and replace it by a block of flats. The Tolmers Square tenants could then be moved into these flats, and their houses could be demolished to make way for more flats," said Mrs. Gavin. Mr. Johnson Smith said his position was that he was opposed to the over-concentration of office building in central London.

"Some firms want offices in London for prestige reasons, when for every other reason they would be better off if they had their offices outside London."

He pointed out there was a need for more office space.

"Such is the development of business and industry these days that there is an increas-

ing demand for more offices. Our problem is to try to ensure that the whole of central London does not become a vast area of office blocks."

It was essential that the heart of a great town like London should not be depopulated.

"We must try to see that as much residential accommodation as possible is provided, and quite obviously it is also very important that the accommodation should not be right outside the means of the people who need to live in central London."

One solution to the problem was that of "mixed development," which had been adopted by the L.C.C. This involved the reservation of a part of an office block development for residential purposes.

Mr. Johnson Smith said he could not promise any solution to the Tolmers Square difficulties, but he would certainly put all the points to Mr. Edmonds. He hoped some solution could be achieved.
