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TENANTS AGREE TO STOP VIOL AND ABUSE

Housing Should Be Priority

An assurance has been given to the Tolmers-square Tenants' Association by St. Pancras Chamber of Commerce that they are in full agreement with the association's views over the amount of office building.

This is disclosed in a letter sent to the association's hon. secretary, Mrs. R. Gavin, by the secretary of the chamber, Mr. A. Swinnerton-Beet.

Mrs. Gavin had written to Mr. Swinnerton-Beet in connection with a protest that he sent to St. Pancras Borough Council about skilled workers in the borough being "lured away" by offers of jobs and housing accommodation in the new towns.

In her letter to the chamber, Mrs. Gavin said: "There will be something like 6,000 families on the housing list who will resist the proposal that council housing should become a prerogative of the employers of St. Pancras."

"There is, however, an easier way for you to encourage workers to live and work in our borough. Every year, hundreds of houses and flats are torn down in St. Pancras to make way for vast office blocks. You can see this demolition going on daily and yet many of these new offices remain empty.

"I have yet to read a protest by you about the hundreds who are compelled to find homes somewhere else. In one case, in Tolmers-square, the Tenants' Association is fighting precisely for the right of its members to live in Tolmers-square, near their work."

In his reply to Mrs. Gavin, Mr. Swinnerton-Beet writes: "First I should like to inform you that this chamber is equally annoyed and much concerned at the amount of office building that is taking place in our borough and we are appealing at the forthcoming inquiry regarding this."

"This policy is more the concern of the London County Council than our own borough council and, in fact, St. Pancras Council are in agreement with us on the matter."

CAUTIOUS optimism prevails at St. Pancras Town Hall following Tuesday's informal meeting between the leader of the Council (Cllr. Paul Prior) and Mr. Don Cook, Hon. Secretary of the St. Pancras United Borough Council Tenants' Association. Mr. Cook submitted proposed amendments to the existing scheme which Cllr. Prior has promised to study although stressing the fact that, even with the existing scheme fully operative, the annual deficit on housing would run between £180,000 and £200,000.

Cllr. Prior told this journal that, in correspondence with Mr. Cook prior to Tuesday night's meeting he outlined certain conditions which would have to be adhered to and which came under the general heading of intimidation by the St. Pancras United Borough Council Tenants' Association.

"Violence and intimidation of councillors," wrote Cllr. Prior, "and the incitement of such acts must cease. These include such activities as the recent march past the Mayor's house on July 4 when abuse and insults were shouted; the crowding of the Town Hall steps accompanied by the shouting of abuse at councillors; the throwing of missiles from the public gallery at council meetings and the sort of assault to which I was subjected after last month's meeting of the Housing Committee."

The final sentence in the letter referred to an incident in which Cllr. Prior says he was "hushed" as he tried to enter his car in Easton-road, N.W.1, after the meeting.

Reply received by Cllr. Prior was:

"While re-affirming the assurance contained in our (the Tenants' Association) letters, dated July 21 and 22 and in answer to your letter to-day, we can offer you full acceptance on the points and issues contained in your letter."

He was Patrick Robert Crowley (35), unemployed, of no fixed abode, who pleaded guilty to stealing 300 cigarettes and two boxes of chocolates, worth £4 17s. 7d., the property of Bernard McCourt, between January 1 and 15, in Arlington-road, N.W.1; and to stealing five £1 notes, the property of Patrick Fitzgerald, about January, at the Brighton public-house, Camden High-street, N.W.1.

He was conditionally discharged for 12 months, and ordered to pay £5 compensation to each of the two people concerned.

Det. Glover, said Crowley walked into the police station on July 16, and said he had committed two offences earlier in the year. He said Crowley had had a few drinks. He volunteered the information, he said.

Crowley made a statement in which he said that about January he went into the public-house just before closing time and asked the licensee to change a £5 note. He said he then grabbed the £1 notes and walked out.

Regarding the other offence he said he went into premises in Arlington-road and took the goods. "If it had not been for drink I would not have committed these offences" the statement ended.

The officer said Crowley had been worried about these offences.
