COLOUR AND DIGNITY AT MAYORAL RECEPTION

ISLINGTON mayoral reception
at the town hall on Friday
was one of the gayest and most
unpretentious occasions of its
kind for many years. The
colour, glamour and dignity of
the night were amply pre-
served in an atmosphere which
was happily free of the pomp
and stuffiness which so often
plague civic receptions.

The mayor (Ald. Lawrence
R. Webster) and the mayoress
(Cllr. Mrs. F. H. Cantwell)
received their guests and led
them to an informal buffet
refreshment at individual
tables in the main hall.

An after-buffet interlude was
provided by Mr. Richard
Morrell, tenor, a member of
the Trio Valli from Sadler's
Wells.

In the main hall the Peter
Harrod orchestra played a
wide selection for old and
modern dancing, for which the
master of ceremonies was Mr.
Ivor Spencer, resplendent in
hunting-pink.

The Lord Mayor of London
arrived at 10 p.m., accom-
panied by the Lady Mayoress
and the Sheriffs of the City
of London.

Short speech

The pace of the evening was
not slowed by any activities
of the Lord Mayor (Sir
Frederick Hoare) or the Mayor
of Islington. In a speech of
only a score of words the
mayor extended a hearty wel-
come to his Lordship.

Replying even more briefly
the Lord Mayor said he lived
for a very short time in Isling-
ton a long time ago. He was
very happy then and he was
sure he would recapture much
of that happiness that night.

In spite of attempts to follow
up the Lord Mayor's remark
no one was to be able to dis-
cover where it was that Sir
Frederick lived in Islington.

Before leaving, the Lord
Mayor signed the distinguished
visitors' book in the Mayor's
Parlour.

There were a number of
noted personalities at the re-
ception this year, including Mr.
George Brown, Deputy Leader
of the Opposition in the House
of Commons, and Islington's
three Labour M.P.s, Mr. Gerry
Reynolds, Mr. Albert Evans
and Mr. Eric Fletcher.

Also present were Mr. Harold
Shearman, chairman of Lon-
don County Council, Mr.
Leslie Walker, Deputy Lieu-
tenant for Islington, Mr. and
Mrs. Peter Webster, son and
daughter-in-law of the mayor,
the Mayor and Mayoress of
St. Pancras, Cllr. T. R. Morris
and Cllr. Mrs. E. Morris, the
Mayor and Mayoress of Stoke
Newington, Ald. J. Cox and
Ald. Mrs. O. Cox, mayors from
other metropolitan boroughs
and representatives of leading
local organisations, professional
and business undertakings.

EUSTON RD. DEVELOPMENT

120 flats for tenants who must quit homes

ALL the tenants likely to be displaced by the proposed re-
development of a nine-acre site on the north side of
Euston Road, taking in part of Stanhope Street and Drum-
mond Street, St. Pancras, will be rehoused. Three blocks of
120 flats will be provided by the developers on the site and
discussions are expected to take place on the level of rents
to be charged.

Mrs. Rose Gavin, secretary, told a meeting of Tolmers
Square Tenants' Association last week that she had learned
from Mrs. Leila Campbell, an
L.C.C. representative for Hol-
born and St. Pancras South
of the decision to build the
flats following pressure from
the L.C.C.

An accurate count had not
been taken but it was thought
the number of flats would be
sufficient to rehouse all the
tenants likely to be displaced.

Mrs. Gavin thought it a good
idea to send a deputation to
meet Mr. Kaye, of Lewis,
Solomon, Kaye and Partners,
who are planning the re-
development. She stressed the
importance of making him
understand that they were not
going to be "pushed around"
because someone wanted to
build some offices.

Mr. David Goldhill, an
architect, said the develop-
ment would involve the demo-
lition of the whole of Seaton
Place, the south side of Drum-
mond Street, the southern end
of Stanhope Street, the south
side of Longford Street, and
the north side of Euston Road.

There would be a 35-storey
office block at the corner of
Euston Road and Hampstead
Road, and Seaton Market
would be in a courtyard.
There would be a 19-storey
block of flats at the corner of
Longford Street and Stanhope
Street.

Mrs. Gavin warned tenants
that they were not going to
get anything easily. "You've
got to be tough about this.
You must make up your minds
that you are not moving from
your homes until you have
been offered the accommoda-
tion you want at a rent you
can afford."

The meeting appointed a
deputation and decided to hold
a further meeting to hear a
report from the deputation. It
was also decided to approach
the local L.C.C. representatives
and borough councillors for
Ward Five to enlist their
support.

WOMAN DIES FROM BURNS

A verdict of "Accidental
death" was recorded by the
North London Coroner (Dr.
R. I. Milne) on Monday at the
inquest on 94-year-old Mrs.
Hannah Bond, who died of
burns after her clothing caught
fire in her home in Outram
Street, N.1, on Sunday.

Mr. Albert Wallace said he
lived in the same house as
Mrs. Bond. He and his brother
smelled smoke on the landing
and went into her room. The
room was full of thick smoke
and flames.

After throwing water on the
flames they saw she was lying
on the floor near a gas ring.
Her clothes were smouldering.

"The gas tap was on, so the
ring must have gone out when
we threw the water," he said.

Mr. J. F. Smith, pathologist,
said that four-fifths of the
skin was burned.

More jobless in London region

There were 61,326 people
registered as unemployed in
the London and South-East
Region on November 13—an
increase of 4,768 compared
with the Ministry of Labour's
previous count on October 16.

The unemployed consist of
44,030 men, 14,715 women and
2,572 youngsters under the age
of 18.

A spokesman for the Minis-
try said that the increase repre-
sented an unemployment rate
of 1.1 per cent compared with
the national average of 1.7
per cent.

The number of unfilled
vacancies in the region was
76,063—a drop of 11,487, com-
pared with the previous
month.

THIEVES RAID M.P.'s HOME, STEAL JEWELS WORTH £400

Fingerprints are being
studied by detectives investi-
gating the raid made by three
cosh bandits at the Robin
Grove, Highgate, home of Mr.
Eric Fletcher, M.P. for East
Islington.

"We are fairly hopeful about
